
“ROLE OF PANCHAYATI RAJ INSTITUTIONS AND LOCAL GOVERNANCE IN INDIANIZED SOCIAL WORK”

The Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRIs) represent the foundation of local self-government in rural India and play a pivotal role in community development, participatory governance, and the implementation of social welfare programs. Powers and responsibilities for preparation of plans and implementation of welfare programs
